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# Introduction

Welcome to the first English as a Second Language (ESL) workbook that accompanies the first novel in the *Plain Jane Tagalong* young adult book series: *Plain Jane Tagalong and the Magic Diary*. This workbook contains many vocabulary words from the novel, broken down by A1, A2, B1, B2, and C1 English proficiency levels so that everyone can use it as a learning tool, no matter which level you are starting at. Some of the vocabulary words can be found in the English dictionary while others relate to various slang words, sayings/expressions, and idioms that were commonly used by native English-speaking teenagers in Canada during the 1980s. In fact, many of these unique phrases are still used today.

## What is Slang?

Slang refers to a type of informal, non-standard language that is often characterized by its creativity, playfulness, and use of words and phrases that are not typically found in formal or standard speech. Slang terms and expressions are usually specific to particular groups, subcultures, or generations and can vary significantly by region, age, or social context.

This book contains a description of slang terms used in *Plain Jane Tagalong and the Magic Diary*. Specifically, the slang words used here were common in Canada in the 1980s. Many of the slang terms and speech used in the book (e.g., “totally tubular,” and inserting “like” and “Oh my God” into many sentences) are “Val speak” from the San Fernando Valley in Southern California. Val speak was picked up by Canadian teenagers and young adults from watching television shows and listening to a song, “Valley Girls” that was popular in the early 1980s.

## Sayings/Expressions versus Idioms

You may find, when communicating with native English speakers, that sometimes they use certain sayings/expressions and idioms that you did not

learn in your English grammar classes. It may be difficult to fully understand all the conversations around you because of this. This workbook will help you better understand these conversations by teaching you the meanings behind some common phrases.

We'll go into further depth on how to speak like a native English speaker later in this series. Please refer to [Other Books in This Series](#) for more details.

#### **What is a Saying/Expression?**

A saying/expression is a phrase that expresses a common belief among people. The words used in the phrase are usually related to its overall meaning. For example, "once bitten, twice shy" is a saying that expresses how extra careful we become (twice shy) after our first experience with something was unpleasant (once bitten).

#### **What is an Idiom?**

An idiom is a peculiar expression that conveys an idea unrelated to the dictionary meaning of the words being used. For example, "it's raining cats and dogs" simply means "it is raining heavily outside." You'll never see actual cats and dogs falling from the sky—at least, I hope you never will!

As you read through *Plain Jane Tagalong*, you'll come across many sayings/expressions and idioms that may not be common to you but are commonly used by native English speakers. Their meanings are discussed in this workbook to help increase your understanding.

### **Ways of Speaking**

You'll also notice, as you read *Plain Jane Tagalong and the Magic Diary*, that the girls use the word "like" repeatedly throughout their dialog, and the boys relate to people using the terms "man" or "dude" when they speak. These are simply filler words—patterns of speaking that were common among young social groups in the 1980s.

## ESL Practice Classes and Answer Keys

Toward the end of this workbook, there are some basic ESL practice classes (including answer keys) that you can use for self-study, to test your English skills. Again, everything is broken down by A1, A2, B1, B2, and C1 English proficiency levels so anyone can use this as a learning tool, no matter which level you're starting at.

Of course, before you do that, let's start by taking a closer look at the eight parts of speech in the English language to help build and strengthen your English grammar foundation.

# The Eight Parts of Speech

There are eight parts of speech in the English language. Here is a brief overview of them:

1. **Nouns:** words that identify a person, place, thing, or idea
2. **Pronouns:** words used in place of nouns
3. **Verbs:** words that express an action or state of being
4. **Adjectives:** words that describe or modify (add to) nouns or pronouns
5. **Adverbs:** words that describe or modify (add to) verbs, adjectives, or other adverbs
6. **Prepositions:** words that are placed before nouns or pronouns to form a phrase that modifies (adds to) another word in the same sentence
7. **Conjunctions:** words that connect sentence elements (e.g., words, clauses, or phrases) together
8. **Interjections:** words used to express an emotion

Each one has its own unique features. Let's get into those features in more detail now.

## 1. NOUNS

Nouns are words that identify a person, place, thing, or idea. There are two main types of nouns: common nouns and proper nouns.

### Common Nouns

- describe a person, thing, or idea
- do not require a capital letter at the beginning of the word unless that word lands at the beginning of a sentence

Common nouns can be either **singular (one)**, **plural (two or more)**, or **collective (a large group of something)**. Here are some examples:

## The Eight Parts of Speech

### Singular

These are examples of singular nouns describing one person, place, thing, or idea: mom, dad, pet, cat, home, town, city, car, girl, boy, brother, sister, child, teacher, school, man, woman, coach, plain Jane, tagalong, mascara, romance, story, teenager, choir director.

### Plural

These are examples of plural nouns describing two or more of the same: moms, dads, pets, cats, homes, towns, cities, cars, girls, boys, brothers, sisters, children, teachers, schools, men, women, coaches, plain Janes, tagalongs, mascaras, romances, stories, teenagers.

### Collective

These are examples of collective nouns describing a large group of things: choir, class, family, collection.

### Proper Nouns

- identify a specific (named) person, animal, place, or thing
- require a capital letter at the beginning of the word (or words)

Proper nouns are almost always singular because they refer to one person, animal, place, or thing with a specific name. For example: Jane, Plain Jane Tagalong, Trisha, Lisa, Cat Ballou, Lanigan, Saskatoon, Lanigan Elementary School.

Two examples of exceptions to this rule are the proper nouns ChapStick (the brand name of a popular lip balm used to moisten dry lips) and Erasermate (the brand name of a pen that uses erasable ink). Since there are many different flavours of this lip balm, and a few different kinds (colours) of this pen, you can have two or more ChapSticks or Erasermates in your possession.

### Regular Common Nouns

Regular common nouns become plural if an “s” or “es” is added to the end of the word. For example:

- mom becomes moms

- **dad** becomes **dads**
- **pet** becomes **pets**
- **cat** becomes **cats**
- **home** becomes **homes**
- **town** becomes **towns**
- **car** becomes **cars**
- **girl** becomes **girls**
- **boy** becomes **boys**
- **brother** becomes **brothers**
- **sister** becomes **sisters**
- **teacher** becomes **teachers**
- **school** becomes **schools**
- **coach** becomes **coaches**
- **plain Jane** becomes **plain Janes**
- **tagalong** becomes **tagalongs**
- **mascara** becomes **mascaras**
- **romance** becomes **romances**
- **teenager** becomes **teenagers**
- **choir director** becomes **choir directors**
- **choir** becomes **choirs**
- **class** becomes **classes**
- **collection** becomes **collections**
- **ChapStick** becomes **ChapSticks**

### Irregular Common Nouns

Irregular common nouns do not follow the same rule as regular nouns do. When these nouns change from singular to plural, the spelling of the word changes slightly. For example:

- **story** becomes **stories**
- **city** becomes **cities**
- **child** becomes **children**
- **man** becomes **men**
- **woman** becomes **women**
- **family** becomes **families**

# Other Books in This Series

There will be six novels, in total, in the *Plain Jane Tagalong* young adult fiction series. They will follow the main character's journey from grade eight (elementary school) to the end of grade 12 (high school graduation) in Canada in the 1980s.
